Samad is a cross-cultural leadership consultant and coach with over two decades of experience in leading Information Technology change initiatives. He holds a Post-Graduate Degree in the Neuroscience of Leadership from Middlesex University, U.K. His research draws from cutting edge scientific findings from neuroscience, social science, and behavioral science on the effects of culture on emotions, cognition, and behavior and their application to cross-cultural leadership development.

The Importance of Community

hen I was a child, not too long ago, I remember things being different. No, this isn't one of those stories about carrying my deaf brother to school through 8 feet of snow, uphill both ways. I'm not that old – not yet, anyway. But I do remember something I don't see in our world today: a sense of community.

I'd like to take this opportunity to address the elephant in the room. The Tacoma-Olympia section of ASCE has had some challenges in its past. We have had challenges with leadership, membership activity, and activity in general. You could even say our section has experienced inactivity over the last few years. We are going to change all of that.



The first step to solving any problem is admitting there's a problem. But this is the point at which I began drawing parallels between our section of ASCE and other things – things like Sunday school, student groups, volunteer groups in the community, the Boy Scouts and the Girl Scouts, and outreach programs of all types. Things like that – where did they go? This problem is not unique to the Tacoma-Olympia section of ASCE – this problem is endemic! And it goes well beyond Tacoma's borders.

I can only speculate at the reasons why our sense of community has been lost. I live in Tacoma, a city of over 200,000 people and part of a greater metropolitan area with almost 4 million people. Why in the world do we live in communities of strangers with that many people around? Why don't we know our neighbors? Why don't we care about that? Is it because it takes time and effort? Do we gain something by being strangers in our communities? Without jumping off the deep end philosophically, I speculate that many of us do feel somewhat isolated in that way.

Maybe it's because being involved can be difficult sometimes. Maybe it's because people think that community is something that just happens – it isn't intentional. That's definitely not true. It takes time and resources. It takes effort and commitment. It takes someone saying, "I know I'm tired when I go home from work every day, and I work hard. And now I'm going to sacrifice some of my personal time and resources to give it to someone else – someone who needs it. Without expecting anything in return." Maybe that's why people choose not to participate in volunteer activities. Like ASCE. Like Habitat for Humanity. Like Sunday school. Like STEM, or tutoring at your local school, or even going into a classroom and talking about your job to children.

I'm not here to tell you that you owe that to anybody. But I am here to say that when you choose to give your personal time and resources and commitment to a greater cause, you do get something back. It's called fulfillment. There is no greater feeling than knowing that you had a positive impact on someone else's life. If you chose to spend just one evening of your month with a local college student struggling with math, for example, you could change that student's life. And if you don't think there is a need for that, you're wrong.

If you think I'm painting a falsely welcoming picture or some type of hyperbole, then try it and see for yourself. Because I can tell you that it does change lives. It most certainly changed mine – and maybe that's why I care so much. Now is the time to get involved. ASCE and programs like ours offer members plenty of opportunities to be involved and create a sense of community. And if you choose to put that kind of positive energy out in to the world, it will come back to you. That is why things like this are important, and that is why we need you to make our collective future brighter! There are numerous opportunities to get involved! 
Recent Events
